Greetings from our Co-founders by Frank Williams Jr. and Jim Isenberg

Summer is here and Grandpas United™ is alive and well! Despite the pandemic, Grandpas United™ moved forward and expanded with chapters in five NY cities. In addition, Grandpas United™ continues to create innovative, intergenerational programs. Some may think that Grandpas are "grumpy," but we're actually quite resilient and committed to supporting youth in our communities.

With the ongoing support of our incredible state, county and city leaders,

we are building a model of Grandpas United[™] that can be replicated across New York, and hopefully, throughout our country. We were recently honored with a Program of Distinction designation by the national organization, Generations United. We continue our collaboration with CoGenerate as we further our Grandpas United[™] programs which are intergenerational, diverse and relevant to the needs of our local communities. We built a new connection with the Dadvocacy Group in Maryland; our documentary, Gramps Not Grumps, was selected to be shown at their 2nd Annual Daddying Film Festival this year.

Our group of Grandpas enjoyed learning from guest speakers at our monthly Coffee with Grandpas sessions. Our bi-weekly mentoring training sessions continue, allowing us to share our youth mentoring experiences as well as learn about evidence-based approaches to working with young people. We also learned not to call young people, as it's best to text them first. It works, for sure!

Our linkage with the nationally recognized Fatherhood program offered us opportunities to join with fathers who are committed to building strong, positive relationships with young men of color. Inspired by this initiative, our Grandpas came together to organize the JumpStart for Dads program, designed to mentor new fathers who are under 25 years old. This unique program is linked with the White Plains Hospital,



as well as local community and childcare centers. We wish to thank the White Plains Rotary Club for a \$1,500 donation to this innovative, intergenerational program.

Grandpas United™ continues to be actively engaged as youth mentors with the White Plains Youth Court. Grandpas provide weekly coaching assistance to support the youth's efforts to complete graduation out of the Youth Court diversion programs. So far, the Grandpas have achieved a 100% success rate as there has been no recidivism from more than 50 youth

mentored by Grandpas!

Grandpas have also supported the YPI (Youth Police Initiative) program that has now engaged both a boys group and a first group of girls. This "trust building" program is designed to build positive relationships between community youth and police. The YPI program has received great support from the White Plains Police Department and the local youth community.

Grandpas United™ proudly announced its third cohort of Civic Engagement Awards in June. The Awards program provides \$500 grants to each of the six White Plains high school seniors who are actively engaged with community service. We appreciate the support of the Gibbons family who have generously supported this program to honor their father and Grandpas United™ member, Solomon Gibbons. Grandpas United™ also hosted its second Talent Showcase, featuring the Grandpas Chorus, White Plains youth and the dynamic Gramps Not Grumps Band. Grandpas United™ definitely has rhythm! Finally, Grandpas United™ continues to recruit and seek new Grandpas. We know all our communities have Grandpas who want to be engaged, share their experiences and support our local youth.

So Onwards, Grandpas United[™] as we build new organizations, involve lots of Grandpas and continue to be active members of our communities!


The 2023 Daddying Film Festival

Gramps Not Grumps, the short documentary created for Grandpas United™ was selected for viewing at the 2023 Daddying Film Festival & Forum (D3F) in June.

According to the DADvocacy Consulting Group, "Daddying" is what occurs when fatherhood and nurturing converge in service to a child. When we use the word father or dad, we refer to all those who play a fatherly role.

The Daddying Film Festival & Forum (D3F) was created by DADvocacy to offer children and adults a stage to express through film/video how they feel about the relationship they have or wish they had with their dads. In 2022, the Daddying Film Festival provided students and non-student indie film-makers from 17 countries a worldwide stage to convey the importance of fathers in their lives.

D3F expanded in 2023 to also specifically encourage dad and father figure filmmakers to submit their own films for consideration. Grandpas United is proud to have been selected by the Festival's panel of judges to be included in this year's groundbreaking festival. COFFEE WITH GRANDPAS...

Grandpas United™ ongoing core program continues to inform and build connections as our Grandpas United community grows.

The Grandpas enjoyed very interesting programs this year, including:



2023 kicked off with a conversation with Kent Washington, the first African American to play professional basketball in Communist Poland.

Recruited into the top Polish league in 1979, Washington went on to play five seasons in the Solidarity-era communist country. His story told for the first time in his memoir, Kentomania: A Black Basketball Virtuoso in Communist Poland, is unprecedented, weaving together professionalism, race, and politics in powerful and daring ways.

In honor of Black History Month, Grandpas United welcomed guest speaker Dr. George Pruitt, President Emeritus of Thomas Edison State University.

Dr. Pruitt, author of "From Protest to President" shared his experiences as a young boy traveling between Canton, Mississippi and Chicago during the 1960s and 1970s. Dr. Pruitt was engaged in high school and college in student protests and also had barbershop encounters with Malcom X.

Dr. Pruitt was instrumental in illuminating the significance of Historical Black Colleges and Universities across the country.





White Plains High School's Principal Emerly Martinez, along with Assistant Principals Vitiello and Figueroa, spoke about "Preparing Our Young People for the Future."

There are many innovative programs in process and coming soon at White Plains High School, including inter-generational opportunities for the Grandpas to mentor students in both academic tracks and pathways to careers in skilled trades.

Dr. Leanne Levin, Clinical Psychologist at New York Medical College, spoke on the subject of The Aging Brain.

Some of the protective factors to improve brain function and delay cognitive decline included healthy lifestyle, keeping your brain active through hobbies and interests, as well as establishing and maintaining meaningful relationships through groups like Grandpas United. We completely agree!





JumpStart for Dads: Summer Update

It is an exciting time for Grandpas United[™] JumpStart for Dads skills and support program for new and expectant dads! Much work on the program was done throughout the Winter and Spring. The JumpStart planning committee of Ervan, Vito, Ellen, Kassandra and Eric Rios put the final touches on our JumpStart for Dads brochure and poster.

Both the brochure and the poster were printed in English and Spanish, and the poster has a QR code for quick access to contact information. The promotional materials are being distributed to our recruiting partners, including White Plains Hospital, community health centers, obstetrical and pediatric offices, Planned Parenthood, houses of worship, and other community agencies. Committee members have already met with staff at White Plains Hospital, the Greenburgh Health Center, The Sun River Health Center in Peekskill and the Open Door Health Center in Ossining. All these recruiting partners have been VERY EXCITED about the program.

Anticipating high demand, more Grandpas have joined Ervan and Vito to be additional JumpStart for Dads facilitators. Thanks go to Paul Schiffman from White Plains, as well as Harry Campbell and Dave Shakin from Ossining. All of us, including Eric Rios (facilitator of our Spanish speaking program) have been meeting regularly to discuss how to introduce new dad participants to the program and how to best present the curriculum for our program, *Fathering in 15* from the National Fatherhood Clearing House (NRFC). Participant recruitment has begun and we hope to have our first session this summer. By the way, we need more Spanish speaking facilitators. Please refer anyone you know who might be available and interested to Kassandra, Ellen, Ervan or Vito.

Grandpas at White Plains High School

For over a year, Grandpas United™ member, David Greene, has been working with White Plains High School's Internship Committee made up of teachers, parents, administrators, and school counselors to develop a Senior Internship Experience called SITE (Senior Internship Tiger Experience).

This Spring, its pilot program involving approximately 12 students was a big success. Some of the projects include work at White Plains Hospital, Burke Rehabilitation Center, The Youth Court, an insurance company, and an art gallery.

Next year the program will evolve to hopefully involve more students.

Additionally, we are working with the WPHS administrative team to identify ways for Grandpas to partner with WPHS staff members in hopes of mentoring students who may need additional support. This may be done through the internship experience or through other avenues which are still being explored.



Grandpas United™ Mentoring: Actual "Grand-fatherhood" Not Required!

I enjoy kids, I enjoy teaching them and learning from them. When I heard about mentoring opportunities at Grandpas UnitedTM, it certainly sounded interesting. I went to some of their meetings and was impressed by the skilled group of guys from all walks and ways of life. Through the meetings, I learned there are many boys right here in Westchester County who need male role models.

A role model — what's THAT? It's someone with a lot of wisdom, gained from experience. Grandpas United™ is full of role models! Some of us are grandfathers, but it's not a requirement of participation. Our name is derived from the role we play, which is similar to the role a Grandpa often plays in the life of a boy: a unique voice of guidance. And "United" means that we work together to make things better in our community now and in the future. Under the umbrella of the White Plains Youth Bureau, Grandpas United™ pursues three main activities: one-onone mentoring, group-to-group mentoring, and Grandpa Time.

One-on-One Mentoring

To understand the current one-on-one activities, we need to provide some background on the Westchester Youth Court. Youth Court is where boys in Westchester who have gotten into some type of minor trouble are sent. Taking responsibility for whatever they did usually involves community service that is, hopefully, enlightening rather than punitive. The role of the Youth Court is to determine the appropriate amount of community service the youth should perform to right the situation. The roles of judge, jury, prosecutor, and defense are all performed by high school students: the youth's peers. They do a remarkable job.

One of the community service activities the Youth Court can assign is to spend time with a member of Grandpas UnitedTM, usually communicating by phone or on Zoom. Each session is about an hour. To prepare, Grandpas are trained by social workers, who help us understand the role of mentor — what it is, and what it is not. For example, mentors are not Mom/Dad replacements.

We are not social workers, teachers, police officers, nor do we serve as alternative communication channels for the boy and the people in his life. Our role is to know about the

youth and understand his situation. We're on the his side: after we hear his story, our goal is to offer non-judgmental perspectives that can help him learn and grow from his mistake.

Group-to-Group Mentoring

Group mentoring started in White Plains' Church Street Elementary School. Every other week, a group of Grandpas meets with more than a dozen boys during their lunch period. We spend time interacting with the boys, and we often split up into small groups to play various board games like chess, mancala, or sets. The members and activities of the small groups change each time. Despite their vast experience, not all Grandpas know how to play chess, mancala, or sets, so "who teaches whom" also changes — and that's the most fun.

Grandpa Time: Coffee with Grandpas

Coffee with Grandpas is where we get to know each other and about community issues and leaders. The times and locations of these events vary, so we hope you'll send us your email address to let you know when something's coming up. We'd love to have you join us:

Could YOU be a Grandpa?

We welcome all men with experience who care about children and want to help their neighbors. The only age requirement is that you are over 45 and you don't mind being referred to as "Grandpa." The work is deeply rewarding and the networking and friend-raising that happens among the Grandpas is invaluable. We ALL learn!

Mentor training with social workers is provided every other week. The hour-long sessions help Grandpas who are new to mentoring as well as those with experience who want to improve their mentoring skills. *Mentoring Training* alternates with the *Group-to-Group Mentoring* sessions with the elementary school students.

Their future plans include a wide variety of objectives from cybersecurity and law to serving those in need, as well as politics. They are quite a group of highly talented, committed young people, and Grandpas United is very proud to honor them.

My Name is Sophia Farrell. I am a 12th grader at White Plains High School. I was born and raised in Washington Heights in Manhattan and moved to White Plains in 2020. I live with my biological sister, but she is like a mother to me. In school, I was a student of the quarter last year and this year and now I am in the National Honor Society. I am a part of the GO Senate and am in the Margaret's Place peer mentorship program and Midnight Run. I help tutor a student in my old teacher's science class. In addition, outside of school I was a part of the Youth Court, am President of the Mayor's Youth Council, youth of the year for 2022, and a part of Family services of Westchester's Youth Council. After high school, I plan to attend Siena College and study law and politics. I want to go to law school and become a lawyer or politician because I want to help people get what they need.



Hello, my name is Katherine Peller. I am a senior at White Plains High School. I enjoy art, gardening and reading. I have reached out through my community connecting to people through the things I enjoy. I have helped and taught people of various ages how to paint and enjoy art at paint nights. I have grown and shared plants to people in need and I have helped in my school library and book/library club to better the library and make it a safe space for everyone. Connecting people and giving them the chance to explore and grow has always been something I have enjoyed and thrived for.





My name is Tyler Japal, a high school graduate from EF Academy New York, as well as a rising freshman at Cornell University where I will be studying government. I have been a part of the White Plains Youth Bureau since elementary school and would not have gotten to this stage without their guidance and opportunities. I participated in their boys Saturday Academy program and volunteered in Youth Bureau food drives. As a member of Westchester County Youth Council (WCYC), I advocated for funding programs that created opportunities for leadership training, mental health wellness, and tutoring for youths and their families. I also facilitated training to raise awareness and educate youths to make better decisions, including for their own safety, on topics such as gun violence, mental health, and racism. As an Eagle Scout, I organized Troop-sponsored events including fundraising and community service to support the elderly, veterans, fellow scouts, and our military troops.



I am Daniel Rivera and for the past two years, I have volunteered at the White Plains Youth Bureau, helping needy families struggling with necessities. I did spring planting at the Bethel Community Garden, and harvested and cleaned up in the Fall. Over the past three years I have bundled and distributed groceries and gifts during the holidays. I plan to continue to be an active volunteer at college as well as in the local community.

An act of civic engagement that I am most proud of is my involvement at the White Plains Police Department. They are a person who made a mistake, so my job was to let the jurors see their human side and to request they provide the client with a second chance. Programs like Youth Court gives client a second chance so they can move on with their lives. This Program fills me with a sense of pride like no other and I'm grateful for having had this opportunity.



Camino de Santiago: Walking the Pilgrim's Path by Dean Wiltshire

Two years ago, I wrote on my bucket list that on my (70th) birthday, I would walk the pilgrim's path in Spain called The Camino Santiago. Inspired by a friend who had walked it, as well as the movie "The Way" starring Martin Sheen, I decided a 490-mile walk was a wonderful way to commemorate my coming of age into my seventies.

I arrived in France on April 28, 2023, with one pair of hiking boots and all my provisions in a backpack, with intentions of completing the walk in six weeks, starting from St. Jean-Pied-de-Port in France to Santiago de Compostela in Spain.

The ancient pilgrim path, also known as "The Way of St. James," dates back to the 9th century. Years after Christ's crucifixion, the disciple St. James was preaching in Jerusalem, where he was killed by Herod in 62 A.D. His body was



carried by his disciples from Jerusalem to Santiago, Spain and the route they traveled has been traditionally marked as the Pilgrims Path.

Today, it is a UNESCO World Heritage Site, and people from all over the world with no religious intent or affiliations walk the path for the experience of viewing ancient towns, cathedrals, unforgettable mountain ranges, serene pastures, waterfalls, and wild horses roaming freely.

Few words or pictures can adequately capture all my experiences, but the one thing that stands out are the people I

met on the 490-mile walk. I have made friends with many people from various parts of the world who were also traveling on this peaceful journey and shared and learned a lot about myself and others. Arriving in Santiago on June 2, 2023, I received a certificate validating the miles traveled and returned home feeling renewed.











Jackie Robinson Museum Intergenerational Fieldtrip

In honor of Black History Month, two Youth Bureau vans filled with students and Grandpas made the trip to Lower Manhattan in NYC to visit the Jackie Robinson Museum. It was a beautiful space with a mix of classic display cases and interactive multimedia to keep everyone in our intergenerational group interested.

The museum chronicles Robinson's extraordinary life against the backdrop of U.S. history, beginning with his birth in 1919. The artifacts, videos and interactive experiences

highlight Robinson's multifaceted commitment to advancing equal opportunity for all through activism, civic engagement, and economic empowerment efforts.

The main gallery started with a short video that got the group started and then we walked on our own.

There were lots of impromptu small intergenerational conversations between the Grandpas and kids inspired by the exhibits, especially discussions about racism and his impact on the sport.

One of the key points our group explored was how Robinson became a champion of the Civil Rights Movement when he didn't have to and it was physically dangerous to do so. It helped the youth appreciate when athletes and celebrities get involved in social justice causes

today.

After the museum, we ate lunch at a pizza place where slices were only \$1.00 each, just like in the Grandpas' days. It was great day of learning and lots of fun.









Youth & Police Initiative for White Plains Girls

YPI (Youth & Police Initiative), co-founded by our very own Grandpas United™ co-founder, Dr. Jim Isenberg, had its beginnings as part of the Boston-area police academy for cadets. The goal was to help officers gain a better understanding of the culture of the youth they would serve. What better way to do this than to include the youth of the community, thus creating a mission "to build trust and break down stereotypes between youth and police."

Last year, Grandpas United™ sponsored a great YPI cohort, partnering with the StepUP boys of the WPYB. This year, seeing the opportunity for a "first", the Grandpas sponsored a "Girls' YPI" cohort. Not only were the youth participants girls, but all of the officers, facilitators and liaisons were women.

We recruited the youth from the various YB programs and with the help of SRO Winston Mccormack at the White Plains High School. Capt. James Spencer and Lt. Gus Fazzino brought together a team of phenomenal officers. The participants were told only the basics and they didn't know what to expect.

The first 3 days of the 5-day session were dedicated to the youth for self-awareness exploration, meaningful



conversations around relevant topics, games and public speaking activities. The officers joined the group on day four. They were greeted with presentations by the teens. They, in turn, had to give the same type of presentation, without any previous preparation. This activity built the connection. The role-play activity gave a "shoe on the other foot" lesson. Through the conversations, each participant learned more about themselves and each other.

Everyone expressed how impactful and valuable this experience was. They all expressed that being amongst all "girls" made it comfortable, and they would not have been as open had the group been coed.

"I'm grateful to have been a participant in the YPI program and to serve as the Police Department's liaison. Although I've worked with many youths in the community, it was a privilege to work with the same group of youths for five consecutive days and see their transformation. We learned from each other, enhanced communication, dispelled stereotypes, and most importantly built stronger bonds. Every police officer and every youth across this country could benefit from what YPI has to offer."
